THREE YEAR MEDICAL PROJECT 2024 - 2026

Upgrade Operating Theatres 2024 Hip & Knee Replacements 2025/26

The goal of this appeal is to upgrade the operating theatres at Vaiola Hospital to best practice standards and improve surgical outcomes for the Tongan community.

Five years ago, Dr John van Dalen, an Orthopaedic Surgeon and member of the Rotary Club of Whanganui North, Whanganui, New Zealand, began regular visits to Tonga to assist the general surgical team with complex fractures. Over the subsequent years the Orthopaedic Surgical Trauma project was instigated with support from Rotary International and the Ministry of Foreign affairs and Trade of New Zealand, allowing for an improved service. Equipment and materials for the service were purchased at considerably less cost through Dr Manju Basappa, Orthopaedic Surgeon from Bangalore, India.

With the increased use of internal fixation for fractures, it became evident that the operating theatres at Vaiola Hospital in Nuku'alofa, Tonga, built in 2005, required upgrading to acceptable current "clean air" standards.

The advantages of upgrading an operating theatre are to achieve a low post operative infection rate and then in the future more invasive surgery could be offered to the Tongan community such as joint replacement surgery.
