

**ROTARY CLUB OF CAMPBELLTOWN IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE ROTARY CLUB OF BALI TAMAN
SANITATION PROJECT**

**SANITATION PROJECT 2021 in 3 Villages in Kubu District
Karangasem Regency Bali Province**

This project was a project to supply 80 toilets in Rendang Village Karangasem regency Bali. We visited the villages over two days in May, each day taking over 3 hours. We left from Sanur and travelled in convoys to these villages. It was a long and at times a very slow trip with many mountainous and unsealed roads.

The majority of the people in the 3 Villages in Kubu District are very poor and were unable to build toilets even though clean water facilities are available from existing water sources. With the intention of being Open Defecation Free (ODF), the project was to stop the villagers disposing their waste in open areas around the village, it was necessary to build these toilets so that health and hygiene of these villagers is well maintained.

The selected community/citizens that were surveyed had no toilet facilities and were unable to cover the costs themselves to build toilets in their homes.

All toilets were equipped with a septic tank as per health regulations. These septic tanks will be emptied as per the health regulations from KUBU 1 Health Centre. The Rotary Club of Bali Tamin supervised the purchasing of the materials and the villagers constructed the toilets under the supervision of technical and sanitation employees from KUBU 1 Health Centre. The long-term benefits will be that the villagers now have hygienic toilet systems and the surrounding areas around the villages will be free from human defecation.

The rooms are not only used as toilets but the villagers are also using the rooms as mini bathrooms where they will wash themselves, clean their teeth and bath the children.
